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Social Workers work closely with classroom staff as well as other related service providers. When providing IEP services, Social Workers will complete progress monitoring and send home Quarterly Progress Reports for each quarter. An annual review meeting will be conducted to review your child’s progress on individual goals and objectives then to determine goals and objectives for the next year.
