"he / she / it" To indicate HE, SHE, or IT, you just point at the person or thing to which you are referring. If the person has exited the area, then you point to where the person was recently. Note: You can use your "eye gaze" to help identify the person you are talking about.

Activities: Use visuals to retell the story and answer questions about the story. Pretend play the sequence of the story. Using verb pictures and sort/identify/name he/she in action verb pictures (i.e. "she is eating" "he is jumping). Make animal masks. Retell the story making a book

Phrases you can use with the core word: (words in CAPITAL letters indicate they are on the core board)
HE/SHE WANTS IT, I SEE HE/SHE, HE/SHE IS EAT(ing), HE/SHE TURN, HE/SHE GO, HE/SHE GIVE/TAKE THAT
Things to do at Home:

-Included are verbs in pictures for your child to identify and/or name he/she in pictures. You may need to model how to use he/she (ie "Look HE is eating). Identify: ask your child to point to he/she in pictures (ie "Point to HE is eating). Cut the pictures and only give your child 2 choices if they are having difficulty looking at all 6 pictures. Naming: ask your child to tell you what is happening in the picture using he/she (ie "What is happening?" "Who is eating?").
